It was great to get an email from one staff person saying "I left encouraged and challenged! I appreciate it and you very much!" That was so kind of him.


We do have the challenge of not seeing our daughter and family in Cincinnati due to border closure.

to face corporate gatherings are greatly missed. This is going to be hard for some people.


We have been blessed in connecting with IWs in Spain, Congo, Cambodia by Facetime. It is great to sit in our porch and just connect with these (according to their time)



I am extremely busy these days, juggling local and global ministries, all online.

Since the beginning of this year, I was appointed to be the one responsible for the English Ministry at Emmanuel Alliance Church of Ottawa. As an English Ministry in a Chinese church, in January we already were aware of what was happening in Wuhan, China, but not really expecting that corona virus to result in a pandemic. During January and February I settled into my role at church, preaching through I Peter in the worship services. This local ministry was added to my global consultancy work with seminaries and Bible schools, much of which I was doing online during the winter months when I try to keep travel to a minimum.



Then March arrived and by the second Sunday of that month it was obvious that we would not be able to maintain in person meetings. In fact, that Sunday we both held a service at the church and simultaneously live-streamed it online. By the next week, we had moved entirely online. I had thought that this would perhaps lighten my load in ministry, but I was very wrong. I have never been so busy. Moving online has brought a plethora of meetings, of online courses available, of personal contacts, and many unexpected other activities that needed to be managed by remote control. Now as we consider how to move forward, many challenges are present.



I praise the Lord for the technology that has permitted us to continue to minister to people online, but it is not easy to keep up with everything and everybody this way. I know that this is a common experience among all who are in ministry at this time, so do pray for all pastors, church leaders and professors in our theological institutions who are being stretched to meet the pressures brought about by Covid-19. Living Through the Challenges of Covid-19 Pandemic

What You Are Experiencing?

One of the medical experts explains that COVID-19 affects women and men differently. The pandemic makes existing inequalities for women and girls, as well as discrimination of other marginalized groups such as persons with disabilities and those in extreme poverty worse, and risk impeding the realization of human rights for women and girls. My wife Kee and I try as much as possible to stay home and keep away from direct contacts with other people, and maintain the practices of



social distancing, as well as washing our hands often, not to touching our face, especially eyes and mouth. Keeping house, body, and clothing clean as advised by government and health cares.

What Is God Teaching You?

One of the most frequent commands in the Bible is not to fear. The reason we can contain our fear is that we believe we belong to God in both life and in death. Nothing can separate us from His love and faithfulness. Inconveniences or suffering produces endurance and hope.

What Are You Doing Differently Now?

We attend pray meeting, Bible studies, group fellowship, and Sunday worship online regularly. Loving others and neighbors by phone and social media whenever we can. Loving our church and helping spread the gospel with church by social media and online, for example: I set up daily spirit food sharing with the heading of "Today's Spirit Food" with a daily new topic and related scriptures supplied by one of the brothers and sisters among this 101-people congregational audience online in the website with the YAN AI ZHI JIA from my home church in Edmonton, Alberta. One of the daily sermons and sharing in the topic of "The Relationship Between the Vine and the Branches" is illustrated and followed towards the end of this article as requested.

What Advice Would You Give to Pastors and Leaders of the Church Today?

Keep on praying persistently. Do not give up! Use Bible verses on endurance and perseverance to comfort your faith and encourage youself when you feel like things are getting too hard to do with the pastoral works and church administration. Accordingly, Paul encourages that, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers" (Galatians 6: 9-10 NIV), as well, "Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope". (Romans 5: 3-4 NIV). Amen!

A lockdown in a pandemic is hard by any measure. For someone who self-identifies as an extrovert and is single, it is a very difficult experience.

SO, on the one hand, is the struggle with being alone — during these 12 weeks, whole days would pass when I would not see another human being in the flesh. Yes, saw people on Zoom but no one can tell me that virtual community is as satisfying as actual, faceto-face community. I experienced "Zoom fatigue" as I tried to continue with the various ministries that bring lots of fulfillment in retirement — teaching several ESL classes, doing Alpha (and the spin-off meetings with group members who are seeking), mentoring younger believers, and keeping up with immigrants whom I could no longer visit in a face-to-face way — all on Zoom. As restrictions ease, I'm beginning to at least visit with my Syrian family in their back yard and walking (physically distanced) with those I often walked with. But being on the extrovert end of the scale, COVID19 lockdown has been wearying.



On the other hand, not much has changed. I've often said that writing a book is brutal for an extrovert as it just doesn't happen if one doesn't pull back and work in long periods of "aloneness." So, COVID19 provided me with a great opportunity (excuse?) to work long hours, sometimes 8 hours a day, on my book with few temptations to go out! Yes, it still is a lonely pursuit but somehow easier when there are few reasons to leave the house legally if everyone you want to see cannot spend time with you. So, during these weeks I've finished the second draft of the manuscript and submitted it to a theological/content edit (otherwise known as a "beta" edit). The results of that edit will be returned to me tomorrow and from there I'll be launched into what I hope is the final draft. Timeline? I hope the book is in print by the end of 2020 (though a friend who recently published a book told me this week that a COVID19 world is no time to launch a book.) I am resting in the faithfulness and provision of God. Would love to bring the book to churches across Canada during 2021. Your church? I also rest in God's Sovereignty. The book is a book of stories from the dark days of Communist Europe in the 1980s, written for people who fit the description of many of you who read CONNECTOR: you love





missions, you love your missionaries, you love stories, you love learning! But it is also written for the next generation of those who will respond to God's call and take the Good News to Hard Places in our world. Be on the lookout for a book with a title having something to do with "Living on Mission between The Rock and a Hard Place."

This is not the only journey that I am doing at the moment. My verse by verse study of the Book of Revelation is done during the day. I have a night time project. I have been on Hormone Therapy for prostate cancer. Just had my third and final injection last week. The first was October, second one in February and now this last one in June. There are several side effects. The three predominant ones that have hit me are

insomnia, hot flashes and a weakness and weariness that has sapped the energy out of me. This being the second time that I have had hormone therapy, had it in 2014, I knew what to expect. Knowing that I was in for several sleepless nights, I decided back in October to choose a project to work on. Not being raised in a denomination where we recited The Apostles Creed, I decided to do a study of this creed. I called it my Mid-Night Meditations. Not midnight, but mid - night, for if I wake up at 2:00 or 3:00 in the morning and sleep has vanished, I get up and work on the same. Sometimes I am up for two hours or more, before I begin to get weary, at which time I often take a warm milk with honey and crawl back in bed.
